

The Impact and Challenges of the Act East Policy on the Politics and Economy of North East India

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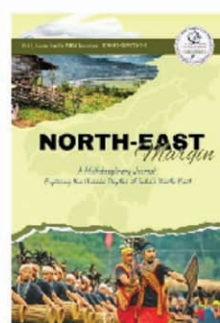
Abstract

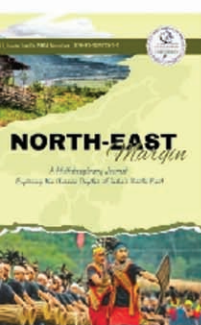

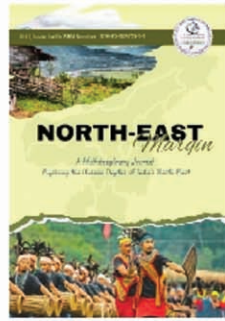

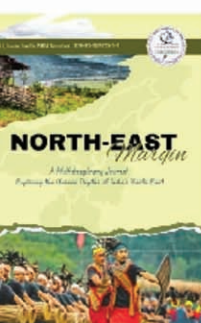

Balancing development with environmental conservation is a delicate task. Policies and practices that promote sustainable development, involve local communities, and prioritize long-term ecological health are essential.

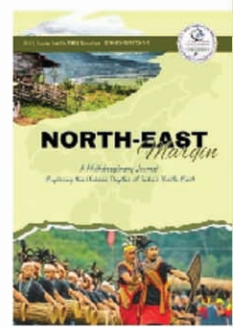
6. Future Prospects and Recommendations

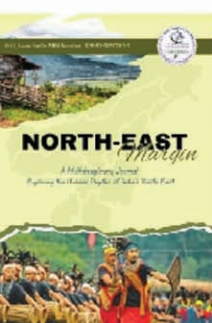
The Act East Policy holds significant promise for North East India, but realizing its full potential requires addressing the challenges and leveraging the opportunities effectively.
